BIOGRAPHIC NOTES ON THE **SPEAKERS**

- H.Em. Cardinal <u>José Tolentino de Mendonça</u>, was appointed prefect of the Dicastery for Culture and Education in September 2022. He is A theologian, university professor, acclaimed author and the writer of the book "Nos passos de Etty Hillesum". He has published numerous volumes and articles in the theological and exegetical fields, as well as various poetic works, also drawing on literary and philosophical language.
- Judith Koelemeijer, MA studied Cultural Studies in Amsterdam, followed by a post-doctoral course in Journalism. Her biography of Etty Hillesum was published in 2022 and was unanimously praised by the Dutch press. Both NRC and Trouw gave the book five stars. Judith Koelemeijer conducted years of research for her biography, at home and abroad, and managed to unearth a wealth of new material about the short and intense life of Etty Hillesum.
- Dr. Ria van den Brandt, philosopher, is researcher at the Faculty of Philosophy, Theology and Religious Studies at the Radboud University in Nijmegen. One of her areas of expertise is research into the legacy of Etty Hillesum. Among her publications are Etty Hillesum: amicizia ammirazione - mystica (2010), Etty Hillesum: An Introduction to Her Thought (2014) and Veel mooie woorden: Etty Hillesum en haar boekje Levenskunst (2017).
- Prof. Joseph Sievers, Born and raised in Germany, Joseph Sievers holds a Ph.D. in Ancient History from Columbia University (1981) and a Lic. Theol. from the Pontifical Gregorian University (1997). From 1991 until his retirement in 2023 he taught Jewish history and literature of the Hellenistic period at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome, where he was a Full Professor. He has published several books and numerous articles, primarily in the areas of Second Temple History (especially Flavius Josephus) and Christian-Jewish relations.

ETTY HILLESUM (1914-1943) was a remarkable Dutch

Jewish writer and diarist who perished 80 years ago in Auschwitz this November. Her diaries, filled with introspection and reflections on the human condition and the personal relation with God, provide an inspiring and heartening account of faith and spirituality.

Her remarkable spirituality and personal journey of self-discovery provide valuable insights into how an individual can find meaning and connection to a higher power amidst extreme suffering. Hillesum's spirituality was not bound by the confines of organized religion. Instead, it was a deeply personal and evolving quest for inner peace and understanding. She saw her life as a spiritual journey and believed that her purpose was to seek meaning in the midst of chaos. This belief was deeply rooted in her writings, particularly her diaries and letters, which she meticulously maintained.

Central to Hillesum's spirituality was her connection to a universal and allencompassing higher power, which she often referred to as God. She believed in the importance of cultivating a personal relationship with this divine presence. Through her writings, she expressed a profound sense of gratitude for life, even in the dire circumstances of the Holocaust. Her writings remain a source of inspiration and a testament to the enduring strength of spirituality.
